Conservation Stewardship Program Application & Management Plan



Thank you for your interest in the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP). Before applying, contact your county assessor to verify that enrolling into the CSP will not have an adverse effect on your property tax obligations. Your county assessor's office may also be able to provide you with the aerial map, and property record card required with the submittal of your application. The Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) recommends that landowners consult a wildlife or forestry professional to establish their management plan. There are many qualified consultants available throughout the state. If a management plan has already been established on the property, please include it with your application. All applications must be completed and submitted before November 1st annually in order to have time for the property to be assessed in CSP beginning January 1st of the following year. Landowners must respond to all IDNR request regarding their CSP property. Triennial reporting forms must be turned into IDNR for the 3rd, 6th, & 9th years of program implementation. In order to be accepted landowners must provide a completed application, a copy of their deed or tax bill, an Assessor's map, a stand map, and a completed Schedule of Practices.

Introduction to the Wildlife Management Plan:

The goal is to provide a diverse habitat capable of supporting increased numbers of wildlife and wildlife species. Management is an ongoing occurrence. Landowners enrolling in CSP need to be prepared to follow the guidelines of their management plan in order to stay in compliance with the Conservation Stewardship Program. Habitat maintenance of this enrolled property should be considered a long term commitment!

 Assessors Map: 8^{1/2}" x 11", full-color, Aerial Map. This map can be picked up at your local County Assessor's office or oftentimes obtained from the County Assessor's website. It is an outline map of your property boundary including the Property Index Number(s) or PINs of each parcel included in the application.

 Aerial Stand Map: 8 ^{1/2}" x 11", full-color, Aerial Map of the property broken down into management units. Please identify (outline) the manicured lawn, buildings, and drives on the property (inelligible CSP land). Also identify the CRP (if applicable) and any agricultural land (pastures and row crop production) on the property. Divide your property into sections based on land cover (forest, grassland, wetland, pond/lake) or forest type (tree planting, bottomland, upland). Deed or Tax Bill: A deed or tax bill is required for acceptance into CSP. It is utilized to ensure ownership and that our records are under the proper name.

Schedule of Practices: A table indicating the type of management practice, years each practice will occur, the Stand number each practice occurs within, and the approximate acreage each management practice will cover over the 10-year management period. An example of the "Schedule of Practices" is included in the Application Packet.

Signatures and Approvals:

This Wildlife Management Plan was specifically crafted to meet the landowner's management goals and objectives for CSP. Success in achieving these goals requires implementation of the specific management objectives and practices outlined in the plan. The signed and approved plan makes the landowner eligible to voluntarily participate in the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) Conservation Stewardship Program.

By signing this application/management plan, the landowner agrees to conduct management on the property enrolled into the program and gives permission to IDNR personnel to access the property in order to evaluate ongoing management and future management needs. Actual compliance with the management plan is paramount in being eligible for the CSP.

The person who signs below is the owner or legal agent of the property for which this CSP management plan has been created. This plan has been prepared in accordance with the Conservation Stewardship Law (35 ILCS, 200/10-520) and meets the requirements. The landowner acknowledges that they have full legal access to the property in order to conduct management activities. If any change of ownership or condition of unimproved land occurs, the landowner will notify IDNR, the Office of Resource Conservation in writing within 30 days of occurrence.

An approved and certified conservation management plan guarantees an equalized assessed valuation at 5% its fair cash value for the acres enrolled in the CSP. This certification is only sent to the Department of Revenue after the management plan has been agreed on by the landowner and IDNR. You will receive a certification letter to sign before you have been officially enrolled.
