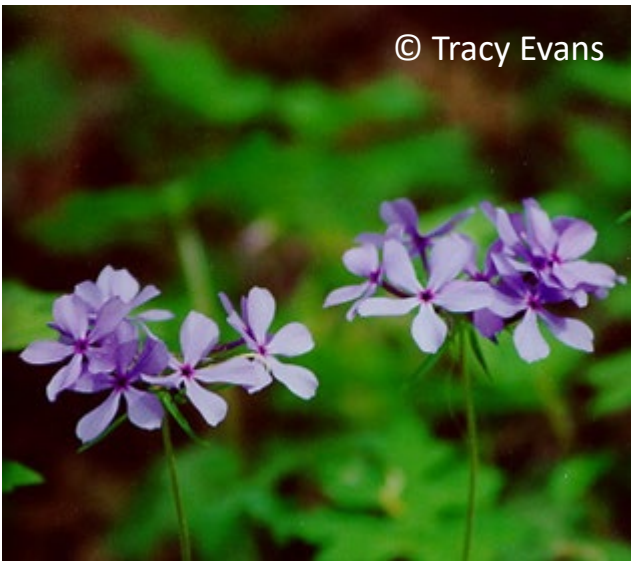

FEATURES

The common phlox is a perennial plant that may grow upright or creeping along the ground. Its stems grow to one and one-half feet. The oblong or oval leaves are arranged oppositely on the hairy stem. Each leaf, up to four inches in length, has fine hairs. The light-purple to blue flowers are arranged in clusters at the tip of the stem. The five-petaled flower may be one and one-quarter inches wide. Seeds are produced in a capsule.

BEHAVIORS

The common phlox may be found statewide in Illinois. This plant grows in rich woods. It flowers from mid-April through early June. The common phlox is commonly called "Sweet William," as are several other species of Illinois wildflowers.
