Seneca snakeroot Polygala senega

FEATURES

This plant has multiple stems and may grow to about 20 inches tall. Flowers develop on a stalk at the tip of the central stem. Flower color is white or green. Flowers are similar in shape to those of pea plants. Leaves are arranged alternately along the stem. The fruit is a capsule with two seeds.

BEHAVIORS

There are two varieties of Seneca snakeroot in Illinois: one lives in prairies and dry woods in the northern three-fourths of the state; the other variety is rare and grows in woods in the northern one-half of Illinois. Blooming occurs from May through September. Native bees are attracted to the flowers.
