Pumpkin Pie was declared as the State Pie of Illinois by a law enacted in 2015. Pumpkins are winter squash of certain species in the genus Curcubita. They have smooth, slightly ribbed skin and a deep-yellow to orange color. Other color varieties have been developed, too. Mature pumpkins are often cooked and used in a variety of foods. Pumpkin pie is a traditional dessert for the fall and winter holidays in the United States and Canada. Pumpkins are a warmweather crop that is usually planted in early July. According to the Illinois Department of Agriculture, 95 percent of the pumpkin crop in the United States intended for processing is grown in Illinois. A single company produces 85 percent of the processed pumpkin in the United States at their plant in Morton, Illinois.
