What's the Answer?

Grades 9 – 12

HS-LS2-7 Design, evaluate, and refine a solution for reducing the impacts of human activities on the environment and biodiversity.

Summary:

A Congressional Committee meeting will be simulated to gather information regarding the possible effects of invasive carps entering Lake Michigan, in general, and through the waterways of Illinois, in particular. Included in the testimony before the committee will be people effected by not only the actual invasion of the lake by these species, but also from the methods used to prevent them from reaching the lake.

Objective:

Students will: (1) research stakeholder points of view concerning invasive carps and Lake Michigan; and (2) based on their assigned role, students will lobby for the best solution to the situation.

Materials:

Stakeholder Cards, one per participant or group Other resource articles/publications on the topic

Additional Participants:

Congressional Committee Chairperson Other Congressional Committee Members

Procedure:

- 1. Have the students read the article provided. Conduct a general discussion on the issue.
- 2. Tell students that they will be conducting a simulated Congressional Committee hearing to gather information regarding the possible effects of invasive carps entering Lake Michigan, in general, and through the waterways of Illinois, in particular. Included in the testimony before the committee will be people effected by not only the actual invasion of the lake by these species, but also from the methods used to prevent them from reaching the lake.
- 3. Each student should be assigned a role as a stakeholder, Congressional Committee Chairperson or Congressional Committee Member. You may want to assign stakeholder groups instead of stakeholder individuals depending on the number of students in your class. Allow students time to research and prepare for his/her role. The Congressional Committee Chairperson and Members should research how to set up and run the hearing and make a set of possible questions to ask of the stakeholders.

- 4. Allow each stakeholder group/individual to testify before the committee in a defined time period. Include enough time for the committee members to ask questions of each presenter.
- 5. After testimony and questions, dismiss the committee for discussion (or allow the Chairperson time to make a recommendation, if there are no other committee members). Have the Chairperson make a recommendation on the issue based on the testimony.

Extension:

- 1. Now that the recommendation has been declared, have the class formulate a plan to execute this method.
- 2. Have the students add additional shareholders and their interests to the list.

Evaluation:

What is the best way to handle this issue? Disregard the role you were assigned and write a position paper to answer this question and support your answer with facts.
