

Conservation Efforts - Illinois

Around 1850, with the development of Illinois railroads, populations of wildlife in general began to dwindle as swamps were drained, timber was cut, and prairie soil was plowed and planted.

- 1853 The 19th Illinois General Assembly passed the first real game law
- 1858 The Natural History Society of Illinois (parent organization of the present Illinois Natural History Survey) was organized at Illinois State Normal University
- **1871** The Illinois General Assembly passed the first act for the preservation of fish that forbids the obstruction of streams by dams, nets, seines, or wires that interfere with the free passage of fish
- 1885 First "Game Wardens" hired to enforce state's natural resource laws
- 1924 Noris Doxey/Clarke McNary laws allowed for wildlife protection programs and hiring of foresters to work with private landowners and the enhancement of tree nurseries
- 1925 The Illinois Department of Conservation was created
- 1929 American beaver (Castor canadensis) reintroduction began
- 1933 White-tailed deer (Odocoileus virginianus) repopulation efforts began
- 1959 Wild turkey (Meleagris gallopavo) reintroduction began
- **1963** The Illinois Natural Areas Preservation Act passes to provide protection to unique and pristine habitats.
- 1972 Illinois Endangered Species Protection Action passed
- 1976 Illinois began the nation's first Natural Area Inventory to document remaining natural communities and rare species habitats
- 1993 The first Conservation Congress was held to allow interested parties to be formal participants in the department's decision-making process and help provide solutions to common problems
- 1994 North American river otter (Lontra canadensis) reintroduction began
- 1995 Effective July 1, 1995, the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) was created
- 2005 Illinois Comprehensive Wildlife Conservation Plan & Strategy debuts
