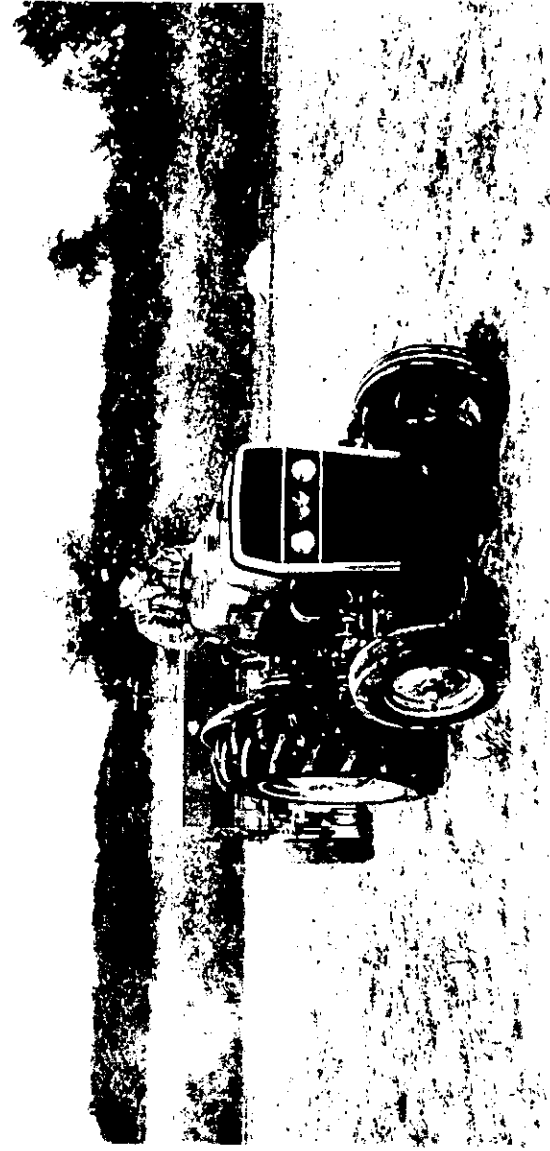

ASBESTOSIS UPDATE

The Supreme Court has overturned the Tort Reform Law which Governor Edgar signed on March 9, 1995 This was the law that effectively prevented us from pursuing claims for workers who have been injured due to exposure to products containing asbestos. With the decision of the Supreme Court declaring Tort Reform unconstitutional, we will again commence the screening of workers who meet certain criteria, i.e. have been working in the trade at least twenty five (25) years. We are still processing the asbestos claims in conjunction with the Bono law firm which is now known as Hopkins Goldenberg, P.C.

Alpha Park Improvements April 1998

The Alpha Park Nature Area has been awarded a "Prairie Reclamation," matching grant for \$950.00, which the other half will come from the Village of Bartonville, Park and Recreational fund. This will establish one native prairie grass plot. This small project grant was available through the "Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Division of Natural Heritage and the Wildlife Preservation Fund Advisory Committee" for 1998.

Ground preparation work is under way now with a completion date of June 30, weather permitting. This project, when completed, will total three acres of prairie grass, forbs and wild flowers. This will help enhance the nature area.

The Alpha Park Nature Area was started in 1994 by the late Harold (Hawk) Kaufman and Jim Murphy, with the assistance of the Alpha Park & Recreation Committee, Bartonville Village Council and many hours of volunteer labor. All projects have been completed without the use of chemicals or contamination of the grounds. If you haven't seen the nature area, please make a point to visit in the near future. Park hours are 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Monday through Sunday.

Access to the nature area is limited to walk trails for persons and *leashed pets*, habitat and animals are not to be disturbed. No smoking or moving vehicles allowed in this area. Volunteers are needed to keep this wonderful project going for the future of our park area enjoyment. This is the only local Illinois native area of this kind. Any organizations, schools, classroom studies, or persons interested in helping to preserve this nature area for the future, should call Jim Murphy at 674-0308. 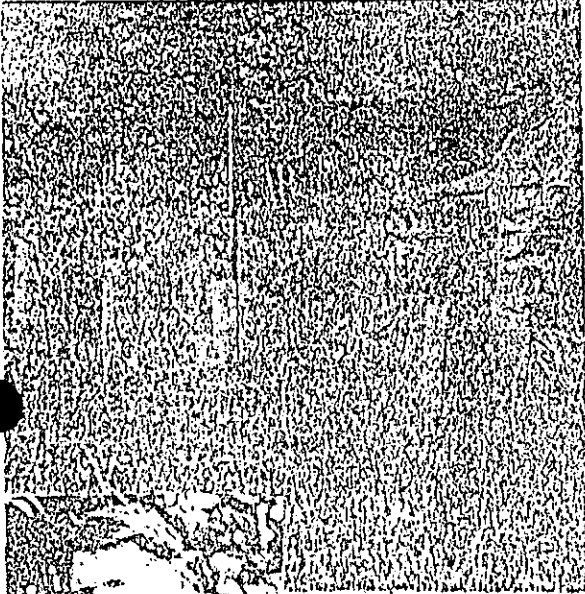

Hawk had a vision--an Illinois wildlife area of native

Murphy suggests riding with him through the thirty acres that make up the nature area, and his first stop is at the site that is presently experiencing a tight time schedule.

"We received a state prairie reclamation grant for \$950. Took us three years to get it approved, through the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Division of Natural Heritage, and the Wildlife Preservation Fund Advisory Committee," he says. "The Village of Bartonville is matching that amount from the Park and Recreation fund."

"That will go toward the establishment of a three-acre plot of native prairie grasses and forbs," he says, pointing out a plowed tract. "Weather didn't allow us to get it plowed last fall. We got it done this spring, but it must still be disced and leveled."

"Then Peter Schramm, a horticulturist out of Galesburg, is going to come down and drill plant it into wild prairie grasses." Schramm was the horticulturist at Knox College until his retirement last year. The project must be completed by June 30, Murphy stresses.

This is the area where Hawk's family and friends plan to erect a memorial. "I would like to see a granite stone placed there on the 1-acre plot, with a plaque or inscription noting that this prairie grasses area is dedicated in his memory."

established," he explains. "This will go as it is this year, unless we see that it is getting out of control, in which case we'll cut it down to about a foot in height. That will enable the prairie grasses to get a better start."

"Next year we will burn it off. That's the way the old Indians used to do it. By burning it, you discourage the renegade grasses that you see here, and it entices the natural seeds to germinate."

"An organization called Pheasants Forever sponsored this plot and gave us all the seed. Their main goal is getting wildlife established wherever possible, through the Department of Natural Resources," Murphy adds.

As we pass along the northern rim of the nature area, Murphy stops frequently to point out varieties of trees and shrubs. "We're trying to establish a natural windbreak up along here," he says.

He points to numerous white plastic tubes scattered throughout the grasses, which support and protect the young trees that have been planted.

"We'll go up this direction," he says, as a young quail pops out of the grass just ahead.

"There's a white oak that we put in--over there is a canoe birch, back along that swampy area--there's some kind of crab apple that Hawk put in--over here, these are hazelnuts--here's

"Everything is so commercialized anymore," Murphy says. "All the pond land is being built up. Hawk just figured this would be a great place to establish and preserve some of the beauties of nature. He loved animals and nature, and he knew I do too, so that's why he asked me to join him in this venture. I really miss him, and I'll carry on the project in his memory."

Murphy adds a few reminders. Access is limited to walk trails for persons and leashed dogs, the habitat and animals are not to be disturbed, and there's no smoking in the nature area.

There's a lot of work to be done. The project is still in its formative stage, and volunteers would certainly be welcomed. Organizations and individuals interested in helping improve and preserve the nature area, and those interested in getting more information about the Hawk Kaufman Memorial, can reach Murphy at 674-0308.

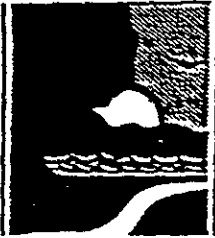

In view of mutual covenants herewith contained, the parties agree as follows:

1. This agreement shall not be in effect until ~~the~~ _____ ~~of~~ execution ~~of~~ _____, and shall terminate on June 30, 1998.

This contract may be terminated by either party upon written notice. Such termination shall be effective immediately. Upon termination, the contractor shall be paid for work satisfactorily completed, delivered to and accepted by the Department prior to the date of termination.

2. In consideration of the services rendered under the terms of this Agreement, the Department shall compensate the contractor in the amount/rate of \$950.00.

3. The contractor shall perform services outlined in their attached proposal. The contractor must provide 20 copies of a report upon completion of the service detailed and prior to final payment for any services rendered during the period of this contract. Any proposal submitted by Contractor for the agreement is hereby incorporated as part of this agreement.

4. CONFLICT OF INTEREST: Contractor agrees to comply with the provisions of the Illinois Purchasing Act prohibiting conflict of interest (30 ILCS 505/11.1 - 505/11.5) and all the terms, conditions and provisions of those Sections apply to this contract and are made a part of this contract the same as though they were incorporated and included herein.

5. WORK PRODUCTS: All documents, including reports and all other work products produced by the contractor under this contract, and any equipment purchased with funds provided by this contract shall become and remain the property of the State. Contractor shall provide all personnel necessary to fulfill the purposes of this agreement. Neither contractor nor its personnel shall be considered agents or employees of the Department or of the State.

6. SUBCONTRACTOR DISCLOSURE: As of the execution date of this contract, the following subcontractors are expected to perform work pursuant to this contract and to be paid with funds provided hereunder.

8. LAWS OF ILLINOIS: This contract shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the State of Illinois.

9. If applicable, all parties to this contract certify that the provisions of the Architectural, Engineering and Land Surveying Qualifications Based Selection Act were complied with (30 ILCS 535/1 et. seq.).

10. Obligations of the State will cease immediately without penalty of further payment being required if in any fiscal year the Illinois General Assembly or federal funding source fails to appropriate or otherwise make available sufficient funds for this agreement.

INDEMNITY AGREEMENT: The Contractor shall indemnify and save harmless the State of Illinois, its officers and employees against all loss, damage or expense that it or they may sustain as a result of any suits, actions or claims of any character brought on account of injury to any person or property or death of any person or persons, including all persons performing any work under this contract, which may arise in any way in connection with the work to be performed under this contract.

False certification or violation of the certification may result in sanctions including, but not limited to, suspension of contract or grant payments, termination of the contract or grant and debarment of contracting or grant opportunities with the State for at least one (1) year but not more than five (5) years.

CONTRACTOR/GRANTEE: For the purpose of this certification, "grantee" or "contractor" means a corporation, partnership, or other entity with twenty-five (25) or more employees at the time of issuing the grant, or a department, division, or other unit thereof, directly responsible for the specific performance under a contract or grant of \$5,000 or more from the State.

The contractor/grantee certifies and agrees that it will provide a drug free workplace by:

(a) Publishing a statement:

- (1) Notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance, including cannabis, is prohibited in the grantee's or contractor's workplace.
- (2) Specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violations of such prohibition.
- (3) Notifying the employee that, as a condition of employment on such contract or grant, the employee will:
 - (A) abide by the terms of the statement; and
 - (B) notify the employer of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace no later than five (5) days after such conviction.

(b) Establishing a drug free awareness program to inform employees about:

- (1) the dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
- (2) the grantee's or contractor's policy of maintaining a drug free workplace;
- (3) any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs;
- (4) the penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug violations.

(c) Providing a copy of the statement required by subparagraph (a) to each employee engaged in the performance of the contract or grant and to post the statement in a prominent place in the workplace.

(d) Notifying the contracting or granting agency within ten (10) days after receiving notice under part (B) of paragraph (3) of subsection (a) above from an employee or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction.

(e) Imposing a sanction on, or requiring the satisfactory participation in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program by, any employee who is so convicted as required by section 5 of the Drug Free Workplace Act.

(f) Assisting employees in selecting a course of action in the event drug counseling, treatment, and rehabilitation is required and indicating that a trained referral team is in place.

(g) Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug free workplace through implementation of the Drug Free Workplace Act.

INDIVIDUALS: If vendor is an individual, or an individual doing business in the form of a sole proprietorship, the individual certifies that the individual will not engage in the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession or use of a controlled substance in the performance of the contract. Vendor certifies that it will not engage in the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession or use of a controlled substance in the performance of the contract. This requirement applies to contracts of more than \$5,000.

VII. In compliance with the State and Federal Constitutions, the Illinois Human Rights Act, the U.S. Civil Rights Act, and Section 504 of the Federal Rehabilitation Act, the Department of Central Management Services does not unlawfully discriminate in employment, contracts, or any other activity.

Vendor, its employees and subcontractors, agree not to commit unlawful discrimination and agree to comply with applicable provisions of the Illinois Human Rights Act, the Public Works Employment Discrimination Act, the U.S. Civil Rights Act and Section 504 of the Federal Rehabilitation Act, and rules applicable to each. The equal employment opportunity clause of the Department of Human Rights' rules is specifically incorporated herein.

The Americans with Disabilities Act (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.) and the regulations thereunder (28 CFR 35.130) (ADA) prohibit discrimination against persons with disabilities by the State, whether directly or through contractual arrangements, in the provision of any aid, benefit or service. As a condition of receiving this contract, the undersigned vendor certifies that services, programs and activities provided under this contract are and will continue to be in compliance with the ADA.

VIII. Vendor certifies he/she has informed the director of the agency in writing if he/she was formerly employed by that agency and has received an early retirement incentive under Section 40 ILCS 5/14-108.3 or 40 ILCS 5/16-133.3 of the Illinois Pension Code. Vendor acknowledges and agrees that if such early retirement incentive was received, this contract is not valid unless the official executing the contract has made the appropriate filing with the Auditor General prior to execution.

IX. RETENTION OF RECORDS: Vendor shall maintain, for a minimum of five years after completion of the contract, adequate books, records and supporting documents to verify the amounts, recipients and uses of all disbursements of funds passing in conjunction with the contract; that the contract and all books, records, and supporting documents related to the contract shall be available for review and audit by the Auditor General pursuant to PA 87-991; and that the contractor agrees to cooperate fully with any audit conducted by the Auditor General and to provide full access to all relevant materials. Failure to maintain books, records, and supporting documents required by this Section shall establish a presumption in favor of the State for the recovery of any funds paid by the State under the contract for which adequate books, records, and supporting documentation are not available to support their purported disbursement.

X. SEXUAL HARASSMENT: Pursuant to 775 ILCS 5/2-105(A)(4), vendor shall have written sexual harassment policies that shall include, at a minimum, the following information: (i) the illegality of sexual harassment; (ii) the definition of sexual harassment under State law; (iii) a description of sexual harassment, utilizing examples; (iv) the vendor's internal complaint process including penalties; (v) the legal recourse, investigative and complaint process available through the Department of Human Rights and the Human Rights Commission; (vi) directions on how to contact the Department and Commission; and (vii) protection against retaliation as provided by Section 6-101 of the Illinois Human Rights Act. A copy of the policies shall be provided to the Department upon request.

XI. For contracts exceeding \$ 10,000, the vendor certifies that neither it nor any substantially-owned affiliated company is participating or shall participate in an international boycott in violation of the provisions of the U.S. Export Administration Act of 1979 or the regulations of the U.S. Department of Commerce promulgated under that Act.

The undersigned acknowledges and agrees that each of the certifications or amendments shall be incorporated into and made a part of the invitation for bids, request for proposals, agreement, contract, amendment, renewal or other similar document to which these certifications are attached.

7. Project Justification:

Alpha Park consist of approximately 95 acres. About 25 acres of the property located on the south end contain two commercial buildings, Volunteer Fire Department, Limestone Township office and a area for equipment and material storage.

Approximately 40 areas of the site has been developed for sports and other outdoor activities, consisting of three ball diamonds, a swimming pool, 2 basketball courts, soccer field, a one mile fitness & walking trail, and an area used for football practice. Also there are two picnic shelters and two areas containing a playground for children. the park has experienced increased usage over the past few years due to the recent addition of new facilities.

The remaining 30 acres located on the extreme north end of the park is covered with brome grass, multiflora rose bushes and a variety of small trees and shrubs. (Please see pictures) At the present time, the Bartonville area is without any Illinois prairie habitat and we seek to convert portions of this 30 acres into areas of Illinois native prairie grass.

We have the full support of Mayor Cunningham, the park board and village trustees. In addition, the village has agreed to help support our efforts by offering a matching monetary contribution of up to \$ 1,000, dollars. (Please see attached letter.)

8. Project Objectives:

To establish an example of Illinois native prairie, by converting portions of the 30 acre area into Illinois tall prairie grass. This will provide an area for children and citizens of the community to study and observe how this very area looked in times past, giving them and understanding of why Illinois came to be called " the Prairie State. " They will also have an opportunity to witness and study the wildlife that frequent and reside in this type of habitat. We plan to vigorously promote tours of the Illinois native prairie grass area to the teachers, school children and residents of the community.

9. Project Methodology:

1. Layout the location of the Illinois tall native grass site. We sought the aid of Mike Miller, Chief naturalist for the Peoria Park District to visit the area and help us identify plants growing in the area, and select a proper location for planting Illinois prairie grass.
2. Establish an 8 foot wide mowed area surrounding the planting site to serve as a walkway around the Illinois tall native grass growing area, and also serve as a fire break protection area.
3. Clear the area of unwanted brush and trees. This shall be accomplished with the use of volunteers.
4. Fall burning of the proposed planting site. This shall be done by the village volunteer fire department with the use of village equipment. We have met with the village fire chief and he has agreed to conduct the burns as needed.
5. Deep fall plowing of the proposed planting site. The plowing will be done by volunteers using village equipment. We already have approval for the use of equipment.
6. In the spring conduct two or more shallow tillings of the planting site in order to destroy weed seeds and unwanted plant growth. Again this will be done by volunteers using village equipment.
7. Drill planting of Illinois tall native prairie grass seed. This planting will take place in May or early June depending on weather conditions, and be contractor by, contractor Peter Schramm.
8. Conduct yearly fall burns as needed to kill off unwanted weeds and plants.

10. Project Location (city, county, etc.):

Alpha Park area is located in the village of Bartonville, Limestone Township and Peoria County. It is bounded on the extreme south side by Garfield Avenue, and on the west side by Airport Road, two of the busiest thoroughfares in the area. The extreme north and east sides are bounded by farm land. Alpha Park Library, and the United States Armed Forces National Guard buildings are located just across the street on Airport Road. Limestone High School, Monroe and Oak Grove west grade schools all are less than a mile away. Two other grade schools in the area are less than two miles away. The Greater Peoria Airport terminal is also about a mile away. (Please see map.)
