Bird Survey of the Waukegan River: April through October 2002

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Introduction

This survey of the Waukegan River focused on two portions: the area near the mouth and Washington Park, including the wetland restoration. The dominant arboreal vegetation of Washington Park were typical floodplain species such as cottonwood, silver maple, box elder, and various willows. Other organisms of interest found at Washington Park were common toad and, in May, spawning white suckers.

The symbols used in the data sheets are as follows: F: Foraging; FO: Fly over; and R: Roosting. A total of 96 species were recorded over the six month survey. As expected, the overwhelming number of these were migrants. Only 21 number of species are suspected of breeding within the confines of the study area

Results

The following 21 species are considered to be probable nesters:

The nesting species are- with the exceptions of the spotted sandpiper, belted kingfisher, and indigo bunting- generalists that are widespread and common. Given the habitat this was expected.

What was unexpected is the relatively few migrant species, and particularly the number of individuals, that utilized the sites. The mosaic of habitats- restored wetland, mature trees, grassy field, riverine woods- found within Washington Park is the type that ought to be highly attractive to passerine and other migrants. One explanation for the low use of this area is that excellent habitat exists at other places in the vicinity. I'm thinking here of the wooded bluffs along the lake and the habitat along the beach censused in previous years. Therefore, the

riparian areas looked at do not provide the "migrant trap" islands of habitat that sometimes occur in other urban park settings.


Despite, what I consider to be rather low use by migrants, the areas censused are still valuable. The river provides a corridor for dispersal inland, while the wetland restoration attracted the solitary sandpiper and common snipe. Undoubtedly, however, the single most significant avian use of the area was the black-crowned night-heron roost in the woods at the river's mouth. This endangered species, up to six individuals, were present at least in May and June. The absence of human traffic is certainly a factor in their use of the site.
