Introduction

The Lake County Forest Preserve District (LCFP) is a special unit of local government. Part of the mission of the Lake County Forest Preserves is engaging local citizens in appreciating the values of natural community preservation and participating in habitat restoration. The LCFP has an active and growing volunteer stewardship program, involving over 2000 citizens annually in restoration work throughout the county. These volunteers, led by staff and forest preserve volunteer stewards, provided over 11,000 hours of time toward these efforts. With the growth of the program over the past several years, providing enough tools at centralized regional distribution points throughout the county has become challenging. These Stewardship workdays are also becoming a popular activity for youth and corporate groups who often bring out groups exceeding 100 people. This strains our ability to provide enough tools when we do have enough staff and seasoned volunteers to lead these groups.

This grant sought funds to provide an increased number of tools to lessen logistical problems in distributing tools across a rapidly developing (read that as traffic congested) county, and to take full advantage of the volunteers who come out to our workdays. It will benefit natural areas by increasing the amount of brush that is removed in the winter workdays, opening up more areas for rejuvenation by native species. The success of the program from our perspective will be determined by the satisfaction of volunteers who are able to obtain enough tools for special large workdays without having to drive around the whole county rounding up tools, and then returning them after the workday.

Materials

Through the use of Illinois Wildlife Preservation Funds the LCFP:

- 1. Purchased tools, some of them "child friendly" and tool bags for the use of the volunteers during stewardship workdays on preserves around the county.
- 2. Distributed the tools in three regional repositories in Deerfield, Libertyville, and Lindenhurst for easy access.
- 3. Used tools in advertised workdays.

Methods

August, 2002 Planned workday calendar for winter workdays

Bought tools, duffel bags, and first aid kits for tool bags and deliver to distribution

November 2002 – April 2003 Use tools in supervised stewardship workdays with youth and corporate groups.

Results

We adhered to the time table outlined in the grant proposal (see workday attachments), and began with the use of the tools in the winter workdays in early November and continued with brush cutting at a wide variety of sites through mid April.

Discussion

The additional tools we purchased through the grant were invaluable as our student participation mushroomed, particularly in the fall. The new Fiskar loppers are much easier for the students to use because of the ratcheting action of the loppers, allowing them to be successful in cutting the



brush. The additional tools also eased tool distribution issues, allowing us to station tool sets regionally reducing both staff and volunteer time in getting the tools and returning them to the regional distribution points. The additional tools also facilitated big workdays by corporate and student groups by enabling us to have enough tools so everyone could be actively involved in the workdays.

Summary

The increased supply of tools allowed regional tool distribution points to be established or fortified. This system reduced staff and volunteer time spent in picking up and returning tools, and also facilitated student participation in brush clearing workdays.



The Lake County Forest Preserves Volunteer Stewardship program has received a grant from the Illinois Department of Natural Resources with contributions from the Illinois Wildlife Preservation Fund.

The \$1,000 grant will help supply the necessary tools used by the Lake County Forest Preserves Volunteer Stewards. Stewards help Forest Preserve land managers and ecologists restore vital habitat by hosting restoration workdays at various Forest Preserves throughout Lake County.

The grant will help accomplish three important goals of the Stewardship program. New tools will supplement current inventory to provide extra tools for big workdays when scouts and corporate groups come out. The funding will help supply "child friendly" tools for scout groups who sometimes find adult sized tools too heavy and awkward to use effectively. Finally, the tools will be distributed around the county at strategic distribution points to reduce Volunteer Steward travel time.

With over 11,000 hours of Volunteer Stewardship efforts, the program has become a vital component to the overall mission of the Lake County Forest Preserves.

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


A good workday - brushpiles built!
