

## INPC COMMISSIONER BIOGRAPHICAL STATEMENTS

### **TOM CLAY** (term expires 6/30/2026)

Galena, IL

Tom Clay has been involved in a variety of program development and organizational management. Tom brings a strong work history with him. His current position is Director of Special Projects, Jo Daviess Conservation Foundation where he is responsible for fundraising for special projects as well as protecting land in perpetuity by conducting outreach to landowners whose properties have been identified as priorities for permanent protection for future generations to enjoy. Tom has held several leadership positions including: Executive Director, Door County Land Trust; Executive Director, Illinois Audubon Society - Illinois' oldest non-profit conservation organization that owns a statewide system of ecologically significant wildlife sanctuaries; and leadership positions in environmental education with Forest Preserve District of DuPage County and the Department of Natural Resources, including committee representation within the International Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies. Tom earned a B.A. in Political Science from Western Illinois University and is a skilled communicator, possessing a passion for vibrant and healthy lands.



### **MARCY DEMAURO-ROTH** (term expires 6/30/2028)

Connie retired from an exemplary career with the Illinois Natural History Survey as a plant ecologist. In this capacity, she has contributed to a number of programs including: the Biological Survey and Assessment Program, Illinois Tollway Biological Survey and Assessment Program, Natural Resources Conservation Service Ecological Site Descriptions Project, and the Critical Trends Assessment Program that monitored long term ecological health of sites throughout the state of Illinois. Perhaps most relevant to the Commission's work is her experience as a Regional Ecologist for the Illinois Natural Areas Inventory Update – a critical update to a nationally known statewide assessment of high-quality natural areas. Additionally, she serves in volunteer leadership roles with the Illinois Native Plant Society, Middlefork Audubon Society, and The Nature Conservancy's Prairie Grove Volunteers. Connie has a B.S in Animal Science and an M.S. in Forestry from the University of Illinois.



### **MARCY DEMAURO-ROTH** (term expires 6/30/2026)

Joliet, IL

Marcy DeMauro-Roth retired after a 35-year conservation career that began with an internship in the early 1980s with the Forest Preserve District of Will County. She was later hired by the District as a Natural Resource Manager/Environmental Planner, where she was responsible, in part, for managing lands of ecological quality or restoration potential, including state nature preserves. Marcy was promoted to various administrative positions within District and appointed as the Executive Director for nearly nine years until her retirement. She earned a B.S., Biology from Northeastern Illinois University, and a M.S. in Biology from the University of Illinois at Chicago. She previously interned with the Morton Arboretum's Rare Plant Conservation Program and was a



guest instructor for natural areas management at Northeastern Illinois University. She has published papers on rare plant species inventory, monitoring and management; authored reports to various agencies and organizations on natural areas restoration and management; and authored two federal recovery plans for federally listed plant species. Marcy currently serves on the Board of Directors for The Nature Foundation of Will County and is a volunteer and member of several conservation organizations.

Chris Evans, Forestry Extension and Research Specialist with the University of Illinois, brings his knowledge and experience to the commission, providing information and hosting workshops



to guide landowners in management actions on their land. Over the years he has contributed significantly to land management activities through the Master Naturalist Program, Illinois Wildlife Action Plan Invasive Species Campaign, River to River Cooperative Weed Management Program, among other positions. Chris is active with the Midwest Invasive Plant Network, the Illinois Invasive Species Council and other regional and statewide boards and is a past recipient of the Carl N. Becker Stewardship Award from the Natural Areas Association. He has authored numerous technical publications and is a skilled presenter and facilitator. Chris earned his M.S. in Forest

Biology from Iowa State and a B.S. in Wildlife Biology from Murray State. His experience and contributions to natural areas stewardship and invasive species management will be a welcome addition to the Commission.

**ADAM KESSEL** (term expired 6/30/2026)

Adam Kessel has been involved in environmental and outdoor education throughout his career. His current position with Forest Preserves of Cook County, is the Nature Center Director at the Trailside Museum of Natural History, River Forest, IL which includes land management on the 750+ acres of Forest Preserve surrounding the nature center.

He gained his passion and knowledge of the fauna and flora of the region through his many years of teaching and learning in the Native American Community of Chicago. As a community member, he has helped to develop culturally based science curricula that revolved around storytelling and traditional uses of plants by Tribes of the Great Lakes Region. He continues to work as an advocate for Native American rights in the Chicago-land area. Adam also serves on the Community Advisory Board for the Chicago Botanic Gardens and the Native American Community Advisory Board for Urban Indian Housing. Adam is involved in a



number of groups and organizations in environmental education and has authored books, curricula, teacher guides, and been a guest teacher and speaker in many settings. He received his Master of Arts in Teaching from National-Louis University of Chicago. He holds a teaching certificate with the State of Illinois, an arborist certificate through the International Society of Arboriculture, and an Interpretive Guide certificate through National Association for Interpretation.

Additionally, he has been deeply engaged in Chicago Wilderness, Hackmatack and Kankakee National Wildlife Refuges, the Millennium Reserve, Brandon Road Interbasin Project, and 30X30.
