# Ongoing Volunteer Opportunities

Volo Bog State Natural Area, Ingleside, is looking for dedicated adults for a variety of volunteer opportunities as follows:

Crafty Bog Committee Volo Bog is re-vamping its CBC! Members of this committee will develop craft ideas made with natural and used materials, and will enjoy teaching the projects to others at special events and craft days.

Weekend Naturalists at Volo Bog conduct guided tours of one of Illinois' most unique wetlands one day each month. They share their love of Illinois' only open-water quaking bog, tell the story of glacial beginnings, highlighting evidence of natural succession and pointing out unique rare and endangered species. The tours often end with tales of Boogey Men, lost cows and other strange happenings.

Youth Program Naturalists at Volo Bog conduct Bog Tours for school kids during the week (once-a -week commitment) or youth groups on weekends (1 - 3 weekend days per month). Some YPNs also conduct one or more of the 16 additional programs offered at this educational facility.

Docents at Volo Bog are friendly adults who greet people on weekends at Volo Bog's Visitor Center. They share insights on one of Illinois' most unique wetlands, assist visitors with scavenger hunts in the Visitor Center, promote interpretive programs, encourage folks to contribute to the site's bird log, or check out loaner binoculars. Docents may play an introductory video, introduce the site's library or check out educational materials to teachers.

### Moraine Hills State Park,

McHenry, is looking for dedicated adults for the following volunteer opportunities:

Docents at Moraine Hills are friendly adults who greet people on weekends at Moraine Hills' Nature Center. They assist with directions and share insights to enhance the visitors' park experience. For example, docents will encourage folks to contribute to the site's bird log, sign up for interpretive programs or check out loaner binoculars. Docents will also encourage visitors to watch for Roving Naturalists along their hike.



Roving Naturalists at Moraine Hills, as the name implies, will not sit in one place for long! Dressed in "naturalist-wear," they will reach out to visitors along the trails to answer questions and share seasonal observations such as frog & bird calls, flowers in bloom, animal signs, etc..
