


#### Green River State Wildlife Area

Green River State Wildlife Area occupies 2,565 acres, with much of the land composed of native Illinois prairie. Acquired by the state of Illinois in 1938, it is located about 6 miles northwest of the town of Ohio on Illinois Boute 26.




The wetland-prairie continuum found at the site is the largest and best remaining example of a nearly million-acre habitat mosaic that once covered the Green River lowlands. The Illinois Department of Natural Resources' management priority at Green River State Wildlife Area is to protect and restore the wildlife and natural heritage resources. As a multiple-use site, Green River also provides recreational opportunity in a natural landscape. Except for the service area, the entire site is open to the public.

## Facilities Hunting

Nearly 2,515 of Green River's 2,565 acres are open for hunting, with only a 50-acre area surrounding the site residence restricted to hunters. Hunting of pheasant, rabbit, quail, dove, squirrel, crow, fox, raccoon, coyote, turkey and deer is allowed. Check with the site manager for specific hunting information.

### Check Station

A check station is located on the main entrance road. All hunters are required to check in before hunting and at the end of their hunts to report game taken.
