Bluegill, sunfsh, crappie, largemouth bass and channel catfish are in abundant supply, and anglers who can adapt to shallow-water fishing will have a great time. The most popular fishing technique at the lake, called bucktailing, was developed there as a way to offset the water depth.

Fishing and Boating



With all the beautiful view and recreational activities at Horseshoe Lake to choose from, you may wish to stay a few days to experience them all. There are 38 Class A camping sites with electricity and showers, 40 Class B/E camping sites with electricity only, and 10 Class C sites available for overnight guests.

Camping

Complete your visit to the "South" with a picnic at one of the four picnic areas located around the park. Each site includes picnic tables, park stoves and parking. Visitors with children might appreciate the playground located at the picnic area near the spillway. Drinking water is available at hydrants and fountains conveniently located throughout the park.

Picnicking

A bucktail is a small leadhead jig tied with several short strands of hair. You might think that deer hair is used because of the name, but the lure is actually tied with calf hair. A fly rod with monofilament line is used to bounce and move the lure a foot deep or more, simulation a swimming minnow. No bobber is used; when a fish hits, the angler feels the strike.

Boat launching ramps are conveniently located around the lake, with nine boat docks for rent and private boats (10 horsepower motor limit). Only trolling motors are allowed between Oct. 15th and March 1st.



Hunting

The public hunting area comprises more than 3000 acres of timber, wetlands and croplands. A portion of this area is managed primarily for goose hunting. A total of 23 blinds can accommodate 40 hunters per day. Additional hunting opportunities exist for deer, squirrels, ducks and doves. Check with area head-quarters for specific regulations.

Visitors during fall and winter see large populations of waterfowl and bald eagles. Spring and summer guests will enjoy the vibrant colors of the foliage. Some of the most beautiful blooms are found on red buckeye shrubs in April

A variety of food requirements are met by producing green pasture and grain crops in the refuge. Research programs, including banding, provide important information about the geese. 
