This publication results from the coordinated effort of the Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) and those jurisdictions that investigate recreational boating accidents and enforce boating laws in the State of Illinois.

### **SCOPE**

Statistical information contained in this report is based on the Federal Fiscal Year 2021 (FFY21) (10/01/2020 – 09/30/2021), excluding the registered boats, which is based on the calendar year 2021. This report contains statistics on recreational boating accidents, registered boats, boating enforcement, and information on boating safety activities. Data used to compile the recreational boating accident statistics comes from two sources: (1) Boating Accident Reports of IDNR investigations of boating accidents that occurred on waters within the state; and (2) reports forwarded to the IDNR by other jurisdictions within the state. In the absence of investigations, information is collected from accident reports filed by boat operators. Data used to compile the boating enforcement statistics comes from three sources:

- 1. IDNR Conservation Police Officer Daily Activity Reports,
- 2. CPO Operating Under the Influence Reports, and
- 3. Reports that were forwarded to the IDNR by other jurisdictions within the state.

## REPORTING GUIDELINES FOR BOAT ACCIDENTS

Federal Regulations (33 CFR 174.121) require accident report data to be forwarded to Coast Guard Headquarters within 30 days of receipt by a state.

Illinois Boat Registration and Safety Act (625 ILCS 45/6) requires the operator of a vessel involved in a collision or accident must render aid (if practical) to any affected persons and provide his name, address, and vessel information to any person injured and to the owner of any property damaged as a result of the collision or accident. Failure to comply when the accident or collision resulted in a person's death or personal injury is a Class A misdemeanor. Any person who has failed to stop or comply with this section must, as soon as possible but no later than one hour after the collision or accident occurred, report the incident to the nearest police station or sheriff's office. If the operator was hospitalized, this report must be filed within one hour of being discharged from the hospital. Failure to comply is a Class 4 felony if the collision or accident involves personal injury to a person. *Personal injury* is defined as any injury requiring treatment beyond first aid. Failure to comply would be a Class 2 felony punishable by 3 – 4 years in prison if the collision or accident resulted in death.

In addition to the above requirements, whenever a boat is involved in a collision or accident causing property damage of \$2000 or more, or results in total loss of the vessel, or causes injury to any person requiring medical attention beyond first aid, a report, completed by the operator, must be made to the Department, on forms provided, within five days. The operator must report all boating accidents resulting in loss of life to the Department on forms provided within 48 hours.

Boat accident reporting applies to each "vessel" used by its operator for recreational purposes or vessels required to be numbered and are not subject to inspection.

The term "vessel" includes every description of watercraft or other artificial contrivance used or capable of being used as a means of transportation on the water. Terms used to describe the various types of watercraft are: airboat, auxiliary sailboat, cabin motorboat, canoe, houseboat, inflatable boat, kayak, open motorboat, personal watercraft, pontoon boat, raft, rowboat, and sailboat. Unmodified inner tubes have not been determined to be "vessels" to date, and thus any accident that only involves an unmodified inner tube has not been included in the statistics in the main body of this report.

Operators of motorboats involved in a boating accident resulting in serious injury or death must submit to chemical testing (breath, blood, or urine) upon request by the investigating law enforcement officer. Failure to submit to requested testing or testing but failing such testing shall result in a suspension of the motorboat operator's Illinois driver's license by the Illinois Secretary of State.

## **Suspension Provisions**

A person's privileges to operate a watercraft may be suspended for one to three years for operating under the influence, careless or reckless operation, or failure to report an accident. Further, it shall be unlawful for any person to operate a watercraft when their privileges have been suspended or revoked in this state or by another state, a federal agency, or a province of Canada.

## **How Do I Report A Boating Violation or Boat Accident?**

Illinois Conservation Police Officers (CPOs) are dispatched by your local Illinois State Police District HQ dispatch center. If you have a serious boating violation or boat accident to report, dial "911" immediately. Otherwise, contact your local Illinois State Police District HQ dispatch center for assistance in contacting a Conservation Police Officer. "Reportable" Boating Accidents

A *vessel* is considered involved in a "boating accident" whenever a death, missing person, personal injury, property damage, or total vessel loss results from the vessel's operation, construction, seaworthiness, equipment, or machinery.

The following are examples of accident types that are used in this report:

- Grounding, capsizing, sinking, or flooding/swamping
- Falls in or overboard a vessel
- Persons ejected from a vessel
- Fire or explosions that occurred while underway and anchored, moored or docked if the fire results from the vessel or vessel equipment.
- Water-skiing or other mishap involving a towable device
- Collision with another vessel or object
- Striking a submerged object
- A person struck by a vessel, propeller, propulsion unit, or steering machinery
- Carbon monoxide exposure
- Electrocution due to stray current related to a vessel
- Casualties while swimming from a not anchored, moored, or docked vessel.
- Casualties, where natural causes were a contributing factor in the death of an individual, but the determined cause of death was drowning.
- Casualties from natural phenomena such as interaction with marine life (i.e., leaping sturgeon causes casualty to person) and interaction with nature (i.e., mountainside falls onto vessel causing casualties).
- Casualties where a person falls off an anchored vessel.

### "Non-Reportable" Boating Accidents"

Not every occurrence involving a vessel is considered within the scope of the National Recreational Boating Safety Program. The following occurrences involving a vessel may be required to be reported to the state but, for statistical purposes, are excluded from this report and are considered "non-reportable" boating accidents:

- A person dies, is injured or is missing due to self-inflicted wounds, alcohol poisoning, gunshot wounds, or the ingestion of drugs, controlled substances, or poison.
- A person dies, is injured, or is missing due to an assault by another person or persons while aboard a vessel.
- A person dies or is injured from natural causes while aboard a vessel.
- A person dies, is injured, or is missing from jumping, diving, or swimming for pleasure from an anchored, moored, or docked vessel.
- A person dies, is injured, or is missing as a result of swimming to retrieve an object or a vessel that is adrift from its mooring or dock, having departed from a place of inherent safety, such as the shore or pier.
- Property damage occurs, or a person dies, is injured, or is missing while preparing a vessel for launching or retrieving, and the vessel is not on the water and capable/ready for its intended use.
- Property damage occurs, or a person dies, is injured, or is missing due to a fire onshore or a pier that spreads to a vessel.
- Property damage occurs to a docked or moored vessel, or a person dies, is injured, or is missing from such a vessel as a result of storms or unusual tidal or sea conditions; or when a vessel gets underway in those conditions in an attempt to rescue persons or vessels.
- Property damage occurs to a docked or moored vessel due to a lack of maintenance.
- Property damage occurs to a docked or moored vessel due to theft or vandalism.
- Poperty damage occurs to a person dies or is injured, or a person is missing from a non-propelled houseboat or other vessel used primarily as a residence when such a vessel is not underway.
- Casualties result from falls from or on docked vessels or vessels that are moored to a permanent structure.
- Casualties that result from a person climbing aboard an anchored vessel from the water or swimming near an anchored vessel.
- Fire or explosions on anchored, docked or moored boats where the cause of the fire was not attributed to the vessel or vessel equipment.
- Casualty or damage results when the vessel's vehicle is used for trailering fails.
- Casualties or damage during accidents that only involve unmodified inner tubes.
- Casualties or damage when the only vessel(s) involved are used solely for governmental, commercial, or criminal activity.
- Casualties or damage occurs when the only vessel(s) involved are not numbered and used exclusively for racing.
- Casualties or damage occurs when the only vessel(s) involved are foreign vessels, thus not subject to U.S. federal reporting requirements.

### RECREATIONAL BOATING STATISTICAL SUMMARY

This report summarizes the Federal Fiscal Year 2021 Illinois Recreational Boating. Statistical information contained in this report is based on the Federal Fiscal Year 2021 (FFY21), excluding the Certificate of Numbered Vessel Reports, which is based on the calendar year 2021.

Illinois officers investigated 95 reportable boat accidents, which increased over FFY 2020 (81). Twenty-eight injuries were reported in FFY 2021, which decreased from the previous year (36). Sixteen fatalities were reported in FFY 2021, which decreased over the previous period (21), and resulted in some 8.5 deaths per 100,000 registered recreational vessels.

The Illinois Department of Natural Resources Office of Law Enforcement recorded 28,886 personal service hours worked on the Recreational Boating Safety Program, which accounted for 9% of total work hours. This was a (20%) increase from the total hours worked on the program. The Office of Law Enforcement's estimated the water hours of 14,304 showed a 5% decrease in hours worked on the water over the preceding period.

Boating enforcement activity by the Illinois Conservation Police saw an increase in the total number of citations and written warnings issued by FFY 2021 from the previous year. Citations decreased from 863 to 734 (-15%) and written warnings decreased from 3,208 to 2,697 (-16%). Operating under the influence arrest decreased from 102 to 65 (-36%). Personal floatation devices and operating under the influence remained the top boating violations cited by officers.

The headcount for the Office of Law Enforcement in FFY21 totaled 130 officers, a headcount reduction of 2 overall from the previous reporting period. Due to the completion of training of 15 new recruits, the time spent on recreational boating enforcement increased slightly in hours worked by the officers statewide.

The total number of registered boats continues to decline from 216,175 last year to 188,086 this year.

Boating accident reports indicate that most accidents occur between June, July, and August, on Saturday or Sunday, between 12 PM and 6 PM Conditions are usually clear with good visibility, light winds, and calm water. Most accidents involve operators between the ages of twenty and forty who have over one hundred hours of boating experience but have little or no classroom boating safety instruction. They also involve open motorboats cruising in a careless/reckless manner culminating in a collision with another boat.

Sixteen people died in 15 Illinois boating accidents. Six fatalities occurred during the week and ten on the weekend 15 fatalities with clear conditions and 9 with calm waters The winds were light to moderate (16) with good visibility (14) In most fatalities, the operators had no formal boat safety education (15). 4 out of 16 fatalities involved alcohol/drug impairment

Once again, the factor that would have saved lives this past season would have been for people to wear their Personal Floatation Devices (PFD). Of 16 fatalities, 12 may have survived if they had worn their PFDs.

The most proactive action a boater can do to ensure his/her safety on the water is to wear a Coast Guard-approved PFD of the appropriate size and in serviceable condition.

### **BOATING SAFETY EDUCATION**

## **General Information**

No person under ten years of age may operate a motorboat. Age 10 years and less than 12 years old may only operate under a parent or guardian's direct control.

### Who Must Take the Course?

No person born on or after January 1, 1998, unless exempted by subsection (i), shall operate a motorboat with over ten horsepower unless that person has a valid Boating Safety Certificate issued by the Department of Natural Resources or an entity or organization recognized and approved by the Department.

Persons at least 12 years of age and less than 18 years of age may only operate a motorboat if:

They have in possession a valid Boating Education Certificate of Competency issued by the Illinois Department of Natural Resources, Safety Education Division, or they are accompanied on the motorboat and under the direct control of a parent or guardian or a person at least 18 years of age designated by a parent or guardian.

Many people operate motor-driven watercraft on the Illinois waters throughout the year, and many operate for the first time. So, we encourage both novice and experienced individuals to take the course. We are responsible for keeping this lifetime leisure activity free from tragedy and personal loss to ourselves and our fellow boaters. The Illinois Boating Education Course is offered with these objectives in mind.

The Illinois Boating Education Course consists of eight hours of instruction. These courses cover the basics of boating safety, equipment and requirements, navigation, motorboat, registration and titling, emergency measures, and the Illinois boating laws.

The program is primarily designed to train young people over the age of 12 years old. The educational material is based on a sixth-grade reading level. Students under the age of 11 may not participate in the exam to receive certification. Students 11 years old will receive their certificate upon their 12th birthday.

Persons 12 and over completing the minimum eight hours of instruction and completing the final examination will receive a State of Illinois Certificate of Competency.

### Two Ways to Take the Course

**Instructor-led Classes-**The traditional class method is through an 8-hour instructor-led class structure. Classes may be taught in one day or over a couple of different days, usually on weekends. The class will end with an exam to pass the class. Interested individuals may call 1-800-832-2599 or check the <u>List of Education Courses</u> by County.

Online Self-Study Course-Students may study the course material at their own pace, completing chapter reviews. At the end of the course material, the student must pass an exam. The course provider will mail the student certification.

### **REGISTERED RECREATIONAL BOATS**

Illinois requires every watercraft, except non-powered watercraft on waters within the jurisdiction of this state, to be numbered. No person may operate, or give permission for the operation of, any watercraft on such waters unless the watercraft is numbered per the Boat Registration & Safety Act, per applicable Federal law, or a Federally-approved numbering system of another State, and (1) the certificate of number awarded to such watercraft is in full force and effect, and (2) the identifying number outlined in the certificate of number is displayed on each side of the bow of such watercraft.

The owner of each watercraft requiring numbering by this state shall apply to a number with the Department of Natural Resources on forms approved by it. The application shall be signed by the owner of the watercraft and shall be accompanied by a fee as follows:

## **Transaction Fees**

#### **New and Transfer Renewal**

Class 1 - All powered Watercraft less than 16 ft. except non-powered - \$28.00

Class 2 - 16 ft. to less than 26 ft. - \$60.00

Class 3 - 26 ft. to less than 40 ft. - \$160.00

Class 4 - 40 ft. and over - \$210.00

#### Renewal

Class 1 - All powered Watercraft less than 16 ft. except non-powered - \$18.00

Class 2 - 16 ft. to less than 26 ft. - \$50.00

Class 3 - 26 ft. to less than 40 ft. - \$150.00

Class 4 - 40 ft. and over - \$200.00

Corrected Title, Corrected Registration, Duplicate Title, Duplicate Decals, Duplicate Registration

\$7.00 for each transaction.

#### **Title Search**

### Fatal Boat Accident Narratives – Federal Fiscal Year 2021

1) On November 18, 2020, at approximately 10:30 AM, the victim took his 12-foot Field and Stream Sportsman out on his pond north of his residence to test a new outboard motor. The victim's wife was on the shore watching him. As the victim was operating the boat, for an unknown reason, the boat listed, causing the boat's bow to go up in the air and capsize. The victim fell out of the boat as it capsized and was in the water. The victim began to swim to shore, and his wife went to get a rope to attempt to throw at him. The victim could not be seen when his wife returned with the rope. She ran to the neighbors for help. The neighbors found the boat upside down on the west bank of the pond and dragged it to shore. The boat had water inside it, which was drained. There was also a drain for the hull that was taken out. There were approximately 10-15 gallons of water inside the hull. At approximately 1:11 PM, divers from MABAS located the victim's body at the bottom of the pond. The victim had no visible signs of injury. No PFDs were located. The cause of death was drowning.

2) On December 16, 2020, at approximately 5:05 PM, the Jackson County Sheriff's Office received a call from a wife who advised that her husband, the victim, had gone fishing on Lake Kinkaid. The wife stated she had not been in contact with the victim since a communication at approximately 9:30 AM. Jackson County deputies responded to the Paul Ice Boat Ramp at approximately 5:23 PM. Deputies found the victim's truck and trailer parked on the boat ramp. The truck's towed boat trailer was submerged completely in the water. A boat was not present at the boat ramp or anywhere in the immediate area. Deputies found footprints in the snow on the boat dock northwest of the boat ramp. Footprints indicated walking to and from the water to the parking lot near the boat ramp. No other footwear impressions were found on any of the docks along or around the boat ramp. The victim's cell phone and his wallet were found inside the truck. At approximately 6:23 PM, deputies found the victim's boat southeast of the boat ramp. According to the Southern Illinois Airport, the wind speed was approximately 12 knots from the north. The boat was in neutral, idling, with the boat's bow facing the shore in a southeasterly direction. The boat was undamaged, seats were strapped down for transport, fishing equipment was secured, and the fish finder was on. The victim's body was located between two docks approximately 20 to 30 feet from the boat ramp. At approximately 11:47 PM, divers located the victim's body in approximately 12 feet of water. Inspection of the boat did not reveal any damage indicating the boat had been involved in a collision. The victim sustained a broken nose, consistent with a fall. No other signs of trauma were noted on his body. The cause of death was determined to be pulmonary edema and congestion due to drowning.

3) On January 7, 2021, at 3:00 PM, a husband had dropped his wife (the victim) off at the 9200 Block of North Cross Street, along the Illinois River, to kayak down the river to the Peoria River Plex Facility (approximately 3 miles). The victim notified him by cell phone that she was turning around and was not continuing downstream due to a large amount of ice in the river. The husband stated he did not hear from the victim again. At approximately 7:32 PM, he notified the Peoria County Sheriff's Department that the victim had not returned from kayaking on the Illinois River. Peoria County Sheriff's Department responded to meet with the husband. The Peoria Fire Department launched their rescue boat to search the river for the victim. The air temp was 33 degrees with a water temp of 32 degrees. Peoria FD reported water depth at the victim's location to be 2.5 feet with an ice thickness of 0.5 to 2 inches. 5) On June 4, 2021, at approximately 7:27 PM, the victim rented a Jon boat at the Lake Renwick Fishing Resort and took it out on the water. Two passengers accompanied the victim so they could all go fishing. According to one of the passengers, everyone on the boat was sitting on one side, causing the boat to that side. The victim and one passenger stood up to switch locations within the boat, causing the boat to capsize. This caused everyone to be thrown overboard. It was determined that at least one Type IV throwable PFD was on board, and one passenger clung to avoid drowning. The witnesses lost sight of the victim and the other passenger as they slipped below the water's surface.
